



#### **SBAC EMPOWER HISTORY**


SBAC Empowerment Foundation (a.k.a. SBAC Empower) was founded as a 501(c)(3) NFP and a sister organization to the Small Business Advocacy Council (SBAC). Our goal is to assist small businesses and aspiring entrepreneurs in disadvantaged communities by providing education, mentorship and access to support services and programs on local and national levels.

## SBAC EMPOWER COMMUNITY

## **Our Small Business Community**

SBAC Empower believes that the foundation of a thriving neighborhood is a thriving small business community. Small businesses employ neighborhood residents, provide neighborhood services, create neighborhood activity, and disproportionately give back to their respective communities. The economy of these neighborhoods is harmed when community-based entrepreneurs are unable to build and scale successful businesses.

Helping small businesses start, grow and flourish can be a game changer in a struggling neighborhood. Because so many small businesses do not survive (only 49% of new businesses survive for five years and only 34% survive for ten years), it is vital to promote the survival of small businesses in the disadvantaged areas of Chicago that SBAC Empower serves.

## Our Neighborhoods



SBAC Empower provides education, support, and resources to entrepreneurs and small business owners in economically challenged neighborhoods or those from disadvantaged circumstances including minorities, women, veterans, unemployed individuals, or those with limited financial means. Some of the communities we have helped include Englewood, North Lawndale, South Shore, Cook County Jail, Bronzeville, Logan Square, Greater Roseland, Woodlawn and more.

#### **Key Demographics**

- Median Household Income
  - \$35,290 less than 1/2 of Chicago's Median income
  - 44.8% make less than \$25,000 annually
  - 35.5% live in poverty
- Unemployment Rate
  - over 2x higher than the City of Chicago as a whole
- Neighborhood Diversity
  - 84.2% African-American
  - 5.06% Hispanic
  - 1.8% Asian



35.5% of the neighborhood population we serve lives in poverty.






## RACE/ETHNICITY & GENDER BREAKDOWN



#### 1 OUR MENTEES

Working with local chambers of commerce and locally run community development corporations in economically challenged neighborhoods, we identify and recruit small business owners who want a mentor to help and guide them with their business.

#### **2 OUR MENTORS**

Our Mentors are procured from the SBAC and other established organizations. They volunteer to participate in our mentoring problem to assist in your growth, help you learn from their mistakes, and have a passion for extending a helping hand whenever, wherever it is needed.


#### **3 TRAINING**

Potential Mentors and Mentees are required to submit an application before being accepted. Mentees must provide details on their business service/product and intentions. Furthermore, both parties are required to participate in a training session to fully understand their responsibilities and commitment.

## A Drive for Diversity

At SBAC Empower, we strive for a high range of diversity among our mentors so several different viewpoints are considered and - most importantly - welcomed.



## KEY IMPACT

We focus on areas with fewer resources, funding, and attention. Some of the communities we have helped include Englewood, North Lawndale, South Shore, Cook County Jail, Bronzeville, Logan Square, and Woodlawn and more.

80% of the businesses we assist are in the critical initial phase of their business with a business life starting between 1-4 years.

2/3 of those businesses have only 1-4 employees (not including themselves) while the other 1/3 are operating solo.

Proving that our mentors really care, 53% of our Mentee/Mentor relationships continue past the 1-year commitment.





Over the span of Q1 and Q2 of 2023, SBAC Empower has hosted or participated in a total of 19 workshops in at least 7 different Chicago communities.

This networking and outreach has allowed Empower to interact with several local (in respect to the host neighbourhood) chambers, small businesses, and prospective sponsors/donors.

Due to the quality of the workshops held this year (2023), several sponsors have reached out to grant or granted us funds for this year or the next.


#### Our workshops have allotted us:

- \$30,000 of grants and/or corporate sponsors due to workshops




The Workshops bring in a great influx of Mentors, Mentees, and connections
